1. EXPLANATORY NOTE

The purpose of the entrance examination is to test the level of English language competency of foreign citizens applying for Master's study programmes and assess the level of foreign language proficiency.

The programme of entrance examination in the Foreign (English) language is determined by the principles and is based on the international levels of language proficiency (according to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages - CEFRL, 2001), namely B2 (independent user), which is the standard for educational - qualification level "Master" and general for students of different specialties. The applicants must:

- know general vocabulary; thematic local lore material; social aspects of the use of a foreign language (features of greetings, addresses, folk wisdom, idiomatic expressions, etc.); grammatical constructions necessary for the construction of appropriate statements; spelling rules of a foreign language.

- be able to: speak a foreign language in the number of topics provided by the programme; communicate in simple and ordinary situations, where a simple and direct exchange of information on familiar and ordinary topics is required; clearly understand the basic content of normative speech on the topics of everyday communication; write personal letters, simple texts on familiar topics or related to personal interests.

- possess: different types of speech and use them in different areas of communication (social, personal, educational, etc.).

2. CONTENTS OF THE «FOREIGN (ENGLISH) LANGUAGE"ENTRANCE EXAMINATION PROGRAMME:

The entrance exam in the discipline "Foreign (English) Language" consists of 1 part - lexical and grammatical test tasks.

It is conducted in the form of a written multiple choice test (with one correct answer possible from the four submitted (1, 2, 3 or 4), which should determine the level of reproductive lexical and grammatical skills.

Grammatical material: Articles. Prepositions. Pronouns. Noun and its categories. Formation of a set of nouns. Possessive case of nouns. Adjective. Degrees of comparison of adjectives. Adverb. Degrees of comparison of adverbs. Numeral.

Word formation. Word order in narrative sentences. Major and minor clauses. Types of interrogative sentences. Indefinite, Continuous, Perfect verb tense groups (Active Voice).

Impersonal sentences. Construction there is, there are. Emphatic construction it is (was) ... that (who)... Passive voice of verbs and peculiarities of sentence usage in the passive voice. Indefinite, Continuous, Perfect verb tense groups (Passive Voice). Conjunctions. Complex sentences. Compound sentence. Compound-complex sentence. Types of clauses. Indirect speech. Sequence of tenses. Participle I and Participle II (forms and functions). Complexes with participles. Infinitive, its forms and functions. Infinitive Complex Object. Infinitive Complex Subject. Prepositional infinitive complex. Gerund, its forms and functions. Complex Gerund. Modal verbs. Imperative Mood. Subjunctive Mood.

Lexical material: includes a list of general topics. The active vocabulary is made up of 1500-2500 general and literary units. The lexical material includes clichés, stamps and lexical and grammatical linkers and connectors, necessary for communication on domestic, regional and social topics.

3. EVALUATION CRITERIA OF TASK COMPLETION IN THE FOREIGN LANGUAGE ENTRANCE EXAMINATION

There are 25 sentences in each test: 15 sentences to check knowledge of grammar, 10 – of vocabulary. Time for test tasks - 60 minutes.

The maximum possible number of points that can be earned is 200, the exam is evaluated on a scale of 100-200 points, i.e., 4 points are awarded for each correct answer in the test.

The entrance exam in the language of instruction is evaluated on a “pass/fail” scale, namely: 100-129 – fail; 130 – 200 passes.
